To practice good Purple Martin stewardship, which will entice returning scouts, landlords must provide clean housing strategically placed. Houses should be set at locations based on flight paths, distance from trees, water and structures. To attract returning PMs and to entice other new scouts, the houses should be set out ideally by mid March. PM's start departing their nesting areas in August/September and are well on their way to Brazil by October. Houses are then taken down, cleaned and stored for the winter to be set up the following March for the early scouts to locate. A late winter callout will be made for PM landlords interested in spending a couple of hours at Aspenhof resetting the houses that were taken down in October. Maybe, just maybe, life on the beach will be a bit more enjoyable next summer.

Questions that come to my small mind are;

- 1. How can a diet of airborne bugs produce the energy for a bird that weighs only a few ounces to fly to Brazil 5,500 + miles away? Maybe the aircraft industry can learn something here.
- 2. What sort of GPS and memory systems do PM's have to return to their previous year's home?

To insure that strong PM families occupy the same house year after year, landlords must take down their previous year's house in September/October, clean thoroughly and set out in March for the early scouts to reestablish their previous year's nest. Purple Martins are daytime feeders and eat only flying insects caught in flight. Cool or rainy weather threatens their food supply. America to nest and raise their families. Purple Martins are monogamous and cooperate equally in building their nest. The female lays eggs and incubates them for approximately 15 days at which time the young hatch. Both parents feed the young for 30+ days until they grow their flight feathers. The parents continue to feed and care for their fledglings for an additional 2 weeks or so. Purple Martins in our part of the US nest primarily in man made houses including hollowed out gourds.



Purple Martins arrive in our area in the later part of March to look for housing. The first to arrive are called scouts who are looking for their previous year's nesting sites. Happy scouts are not likely to switch to new housing from a previous year.

- 10. The telephone at the beach should be used only for toll-free calls, even if you don't have a cell phone signal.
- 11. Here are some common sense provisions about your satellite dish. Remember that you must first get a permit to install one.
- It would be best to put it on your cabin.
- They are not very attractive, so outof-site is best, but camouflaged will work also.
- Remember that three feet tall or shorter is better.
- One dish per cabin is the limit.
- Grounding it for safety is a good idea.
- Please remove and toss your old antenna. It doesn't work anyway.
